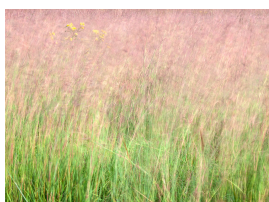

Peyer's long-exposure (2-8 seconds) photographs are his attempt to capture and communicate that experience.

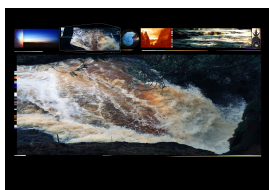
